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## Cleveland bought \$2 million radio equipment that can't be used unless it buys rest of system

Cleveland police have spent \$2 million on new radio equipment that remains unused because the components needed to complete the system were not purchased.

The city of Cleveland last year spent more than \$2 million on radio equipment that sits unused and can't be put in operation unless the city spends millions more on gear from the same company.

The city purchased the device, called a zone controller, from Motorola last August for \$2.3 million in hopes of moving its radio system for police, fire and other departments to one that is compatible with other public safety forces in the area. The city used a federal grant awarded in 2005 to buy the gear.

The zone controller would be an important part of that project, but the city bought it before putting the project out to bid.

The city is now seeking bids to build a new radio system compatible with surrounding suburbs. The project could cost between \$30 million and \$60 million.

Because the equipment is proprietary and not compatible with the city's existing Motorola system -- or similar equipment made by other companies -- it can't be used now or if other companies win the bidding.

"We need the rest of the system for it to be in use," Erica Creech, spokeswoman for Cleveland's Department of Homeland Security, said last week.

Creech referred further questions to Norberto Colon, the city's Homeland Security director. Neither she nor Colon have returned calls for a week.

Experts say the zone controller allows users to move from one transmission zone to another without losing signals, much like cell phone roaming. It covers large areas,

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often several counties. Cuyahoga County is partnering with four other counties to create one zone throughout the region for its public-safety communications system.

Creating an interoperable radio system has long been a goal for safety forces, but the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks made it a priority. The federal government has backed a standard for such systems and is pouring millions of dollars into grants to develop them across the country.

Cleveland's request for proposals for its new radio system, issued last month, required bidders to include the unused Motorola controller in the new system. Creech said that when vendors objected that they could not use the Motorola equipment, the city backed down and is now asking them to suggest ways to use it.

The city's request for proposals is 79 pages, but details about the controller are listed in the 29 pages the city declined to release to The Plain Dealer, citing security concerns. Creech said the city considers technical details of the system and equipment to be sensitive information that it releases only to vendors actually bidding on the project.

"We wanted to make sure we weren't just passing out secure information willy-nilly," she said.

That action, and the city's decision to discourage vendors from touring transmission towers and dispatch centers, are part of a more closed process than other cities have followed.

Kansas City and Houston, in seeking bids for similar projects recently, posted the entire request for proposals on their city Web sites. Officials for both cities said they never considered restricting access to bid requirements.

And Kansas City required potential bidders to visit all the locations that would be part of the system. That city had a three-day pre-bid conference that each bidder had to attend and which included tours of all those cities' transmission towers and dispatch centers.

Keely Golden, who handles bids for Kansas City, said that Cleveland's restriction puzzles her and that limiting access would favor the company that installed and maintains the old system.

Golden said that allowing visits "makes for a level playing field" and that she would have expected other vendors to complain if they did not have that chance.

"I don't see how they wouldn't have," she said.
